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- The Union Health Ministry has revised rates under the Central Government Health Scheme (CGHS) for nearly 2,000 medical procedures. The new structure is tier-based by hospital accreditation, city, and hospital type, and will come into effect from 13 October 2025.
- The 19th FICCI HEAL 2025 healthcare conference is scheduled for 8-9 October in New Delhi. Health Minister J. P. Nadda, along with other dignitaries, will address issues such as Al in healthcare.
- A major pharmaceutical investment: Eli Lilly announced plans to inject over US\$1 billion into India to expand drug manufacturing capacity, especially for therapies in obesity, diabetes, Alzheimer's, cancer, and autoimmune diseases.
- Maps from a global risk analysis suggest India could face the largest long-term burden of chikungunya globally, calling for strengthened surveillance and preventive planning.

- Several states have moved to ban or restrict pediatric cough syrups amid reports of child deaths in Madhya Pradesh linked to contaminated syrups:
 - Karnataka has prohibited prescribing or dispensing cough and cold syrups to children under two years of age.
 - Jharkhand has issued a ban on three syrups—Coldrif, Respifresh, and Relife—pending investigations.

- In Madhya Pradesh, the case has escalated: authorities are now probing potential links between a doctor under investigation and a pharmacy operated by his family.
- The Indian Medical Association (IMA) has condemned the arrest of a doctor in the cough syrup case, saying that physicians cannot be held responsible for contamination that was unknown at the time of prescribing.
- In Kozhikode, Kerala, a 6-year-old girl was diagnosed with primary amoebic meningoencephalitis (PAM) — a rare and often fatal brain infection caused by *Naegleria fowleri*. Several other patients are under treatment.
- In Bijnor, Uttar Pradesh, a fever outbreak has afflicted about 90 % of residents in a village, with one fatality. Early investigations suggest typhoid or viral fever, and public health teams have been deployed to contain it.
- In Gujarat, a recent analysis shows an alarming rise in diabetes among children: 2.9 % prevalence in ages 10–19 (among the highest for large states), against a national average of ~0.6 %.
- In Turakapalem village, Guntur district (Andhra Pradesh), a woman died of complications from uncontrolled diabetes. This is the first death in the village after a month's hiatus, following a period when melioidosis had drawn attention there.
